

He talked of parades, parties, charity work and many other things done by what he called the "poor man's Shrine" organization. Like so many of our early members, he got sick and died one day. John is one of those masons who I have had a chance to meet, talk to, and learn from. He is a part of who I am. I am better for having known him, a complete stranger, brought together by the ties of brotherhood of our Fraternity. 
MESSAGE FROM THE SOUTH
